

2019 STERN FAMILY SUMMER PROJECT

The Stern Family Summer Project, now in its 14th year, is made possible by the generous support of long-time Holland & Hart client and Holland & Hart Foundation donor, the Stern family. This project encourages the daughters, sons, nieces, nephews, and grandchildren of attorneys and staff at Holland & Hart to learn about the value of philanthropy and volunteerism from an early age, and also helps benefit the organizations that are selected by the kids who participate.

To participate, a child needs to volunteer or, if too young to volunteer, to visit an organization of that child's choosing. After volunteering or visiting, the child writes a letter or submits a drawing to the Holland & Hart Foundation telling us about the experience. A donation is then made directly from the Holland & Hart Foundation to the organization in the name of the child.

This year, 38 children with connections to the firm's Boise, Cheyenne, and Denver offices volunteered or visited an organization of their choice, and a significant donation was made to 11 different organizations on behalf of the Stern Family.

1. People paint and donate ceramic bowls to the Empty Bowl project.
2. The community can buy a bowl on a summer day, and get free ice cream.
3. The community can buy a bowl after Thanksgiving and get free soup.
4. All the money donated for empty bowls goes to the Food Bank.
5. Each empty bowl costs \$10.00 or more. Every \$1.00 donated helps buy 5 meals!
6. The meals help feed people in Idaho who cannot buy enough food for their families.



In July, Hailey and Sam, and their Moms and Grandma, each picked out a bowl from all the choices on the first picture. We got a free bowl of ice cream with them! Here are the bowls we got. The money we paid for the bowls goes to the Idaho Food Bank.



Miss Idaho was at the Empty Bowl event. We got our picture taken with her! She was nice.

The next step in our project was to paint bowls for the Thanksgiving Empty Bowl event. We went to Ceramica and picked out blank ceramic bowls. Then we picked colors of paint for our bowls. We painted them – they turned out great! We left them with Ceramica for glazing and firing. Ceramica will save our bowls (with many others) for the Empty Bowl soup event. I hope someone likes our bowls and will buy them then!



The final step in our project was to visit the Idaho Food Bank. We wanted to see where all the food goes and what they do with it. A nice guy named Jay gave us a tour. We saw lots of large boxes of food, and bins of potatoes and other vegetables. We saw people bagging pasta from a huge box into smaller boxes. We saw inside one of the trucks that ship food around the State. It was fun! Thanks Jay!

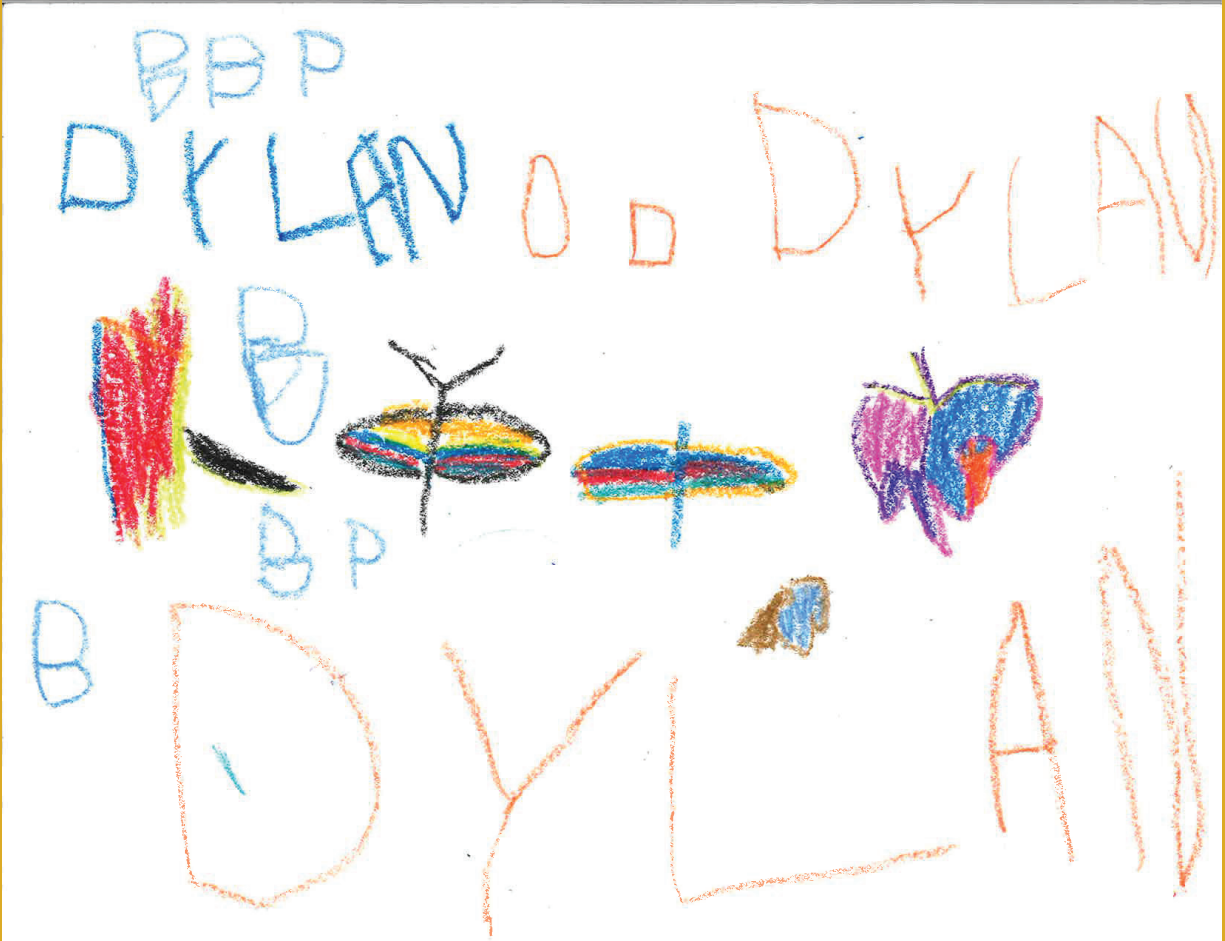

Dear Stern Summer Scholarship Foundation,

Our names are Emma, Grace and Nicholas and we would like you to please consider the GraceFull café for the 2019 Stern Summer Scholarship awards. We met with Julie Hall, Administrative and Community Development Assistant for the GraceFull Foundation.

The first thing that we noticed when we walked into the GraceFull Café was that it did not have a 'soup kitchen' feeling to it at all. The old home, which was converted into a restaurant, is clean, decorated, and stylish. It appears to be just another trendy little café. As soon as you look past the café itself, however, you see that there is much more to this restaurant than meets the eye. The people you see in the café are what make it so unique. When we were at the café, we saw people of all kinds: all ages and demographics, all economic classes and backgrounds. The GraceFull Café has a diversity that you can't find anywhere else in Littleton Colorado. Although everyone in the café is drastically different, there is not sense of separation. Instead, there is a sense of unity. The GraceFull Café, through their generous philosophy and dedication to service, has found a way to bring all people together, no matter who they are. How do they do it? Through one of the few things that all human beings have in common: our need for food.

GraceFull café has been open for three years. During those years they have fed all kinds of people, and around sixty customers a day get free meals. The cost of one meal is about 9 dollars, if you can afford it. If you can't, you either get it for less or free (you just pay what you can). GraceFull knows many partners around the area to help the homeless, like food banks or shelters. GraceFull gets about 6 volunteers a day. They only have about 3 people who get paid. GraceFull café regularly partners with churches and other charitable organizations to provide free community meals—bringing everyone together.

The food serve is really good. Our family stayed and ordered lunch. It was healthy and a reasonable portion that was easy to finish, reducing food waste dramatically. We left a tip and all tips go directly to the nonprofit to help fund more meals for those in need. The waitress, counter staff, and assistant chef were all volunteers. If you order a coffee or tea you choose a ceramic mug from a shelf to drink it from; another effort to eliminate waste. There is seating inside and outside with mixed matched chairs and tables. There are beautiful wooden boxes in the entry way that homeless people can use to store their backpacks and belongings. They have lots of pamphlets and referral material to help people in need. They also have a little free library in the front. The café and staff are incredibly welcoming. They take the time to get to know their "regular customers" who come in for free or reduced meals. There is no sense of judgement there. Everyone is just there to eat—that's all. GraceFull café works hard to partner with the community to make are town welcoming for everyone.

My name is Grace Malone and I am thirteen years old. I live in Denver, Colorado and I'm in middle school. About 1 week ago my family and I made a road trip down to Southern, Colorado to do some mission work for La Puente. We were there for three nights and four days helping around with construction, cooking, and gardening. During the process we got to get closer and spend time with our friends from church, but also hang out with the kids and adults there that were homeless and/or struggled with getting basic necessities. One day we got to make meals for them and it was a really great experience seeing the joy on their faces. I really like this organization because if you are struggling all you need to do is either walk in and be able to use the restroom, and also get a free kit of shampoo, body wash, a razor, towel etc. It is also really cool because it ~~is~~ is a giant home with 48 rooms to sleep in ranging from family homes to boy and girl bedrooms. I will really enjoy going back next year.



My name is Jackson Malone and I went to La Puente for 3 nights. While we were there we did all sorts of work. Some things we did are serving meals for the homeless shelter, working on the garden that the shelter has, work on a wheelchair ramp for the shelter, work on small construction projects, etc. Serving the shelter and helping with their garden is very important to give back to the ones that need it the most, especially those that are working diligently to get back to a positive path. I found this trip really productive and important because we got to do something that we might not do all the time.

Why does the San Luis Valley need La Puente?

- High Poverty:** 1 in 3 children grow up in poverty.
- Homelessness:** SLV Rate is 10x National Rate.
- Hunger:** 1 in 4 don't have enough to eat.
- Rural Geographic Expanse:** Population spread over of 47,000 8,000 miles. An area larger than the state of Massachusetts.

For the Stern Family Summer Project, my children Isabella and Noah Bacigalupo donated to Girls in STEM Denver dba STEMblazers and Second Wind Fund. Their letters and photos are attached.

Girls in STEM Denver dba STEMblazers

Girls in STEM Denver dba STEMblazers is a non-profit that provides STEM education and opportunities to middle school and high school girls.

Isabella, age 9, interviewed a female engineer about her STEM career. The video of the interview will be put on social media and shared with middle school and high school girls so that they can learn about an engineering career and phenomenal STEM mentor and figure. Isabella also put up fliers to advertise for a fundraising mocktail social where Jill Tietjen, a registered professional engineer who has been inducted into Colorado Women's Author's Hall of Fame, will be the keynote speaker. Isabella learned that it is important to share science and engineering with other girls who may not have STEM exposure in their lives.

Second Wind Fund

Second Wind Fund is a statewide suicide prevention non-profit organization that pays for treatment services for children. Second Wind was formed after four Green Mountain High School students committed suicide in a 9-month period. There are increasing and historically high rates of suicide in Colorado. Therapy sessions provided by experienced providers are most effective in preventing suicide.

Noah, age 7, donated his time by handing out fliers for the Second Wind Fund 5K run/walk. Every year, Noah attends the 5K run/walk with his family. Noah understands how important it is to make sure that children have access to medical treatment and supports this organization for making that happen.
